THE PARABLE OF THE RICE FIELD

The Apostle Paul wrote, "Whoever sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and whoever sows bountifully will also reap bountifully" (2 Corinthians 9:6). We will reap what we sow. If we sow kindness, we will reap kindness. If we sow discord and selfishness, that is what we will reap.

There is a parable told in India about the selfish man who inherited a rice field. The first year the man irrigated the field, and it was fruitful. The water, in fact, flowed onto his neighbor's field, and this, too, produced a bountiful harvest.

But the next year, the selfish man reasoned: Why should I let this water flow through my field into his? Water is precious, and I must keep it. So, he built a dam. This prevented the water from flowing into his neighbor's field, but it proved disastrous to his own crop as well. Irrigation water nourished the field only if it flowed. When it did not move because of the dam, the water became stagnant and the field a swamp.

We own no rice fields. Still, the parable is clear. Think of what we have inherited from God; think of all He has given us. If we are selfish, refusing to share and keep it all for ourselves, our lives become stagnant, dismal swamps of mere existence. But if we give back to God by giving to others, both the giver and the receiver share in the fruits of God's love.

ELDERS CORNER – JUNE 2023

If you're like Pastor Todd, Julia Parker and me, there are a couple of bucket list foreign trips that are so intriguing that we just have to go. We have been talking about these trips for a couple of years, but now is the time to actually make them happen. These trips are (1) The Holy Land (Israel, and maybe a side trip to Egypt) and/or (2) the El Camino de Santiago in France and Spain. We have discussed these two trips before the Elders and they have agreed to allow us to drum up enthusiasm among the members of the congregation and explore the feasibility of a group of us actually going on one or both of these trips. You will probably not see these trips in our Church budget because the costs will have to be carried by the folks actually taking the trips.

The Holy Land – Israel

Would you like to go on a spiritual journey focusing on the life and times of Jesus, "walking where Jesus walked?" Imagine yourself in Galilee, and in Capernaum – referred as Jesus' "own town" (*Matthew 9:1*), where Jesus began his ministry (*Mark 1:21 John 6:59*), and recruited his first disciple (*John 21:15-17*). Stand on the Mt. of Beatitudes (*Matthew 5, Matthew 6, Matthew 7, Matthew 8*) and make believe you are listening to the Lord preach the Sermon on the Mount. Submerge yourself in the Jordan River, where Jesus was baptized by John the Baptist (*John 1:29-33*). Continue on to Jerusalem, and walk the Stations of the Cross on the Via Dolorosa, where you can take time to reflect the Lords sacrifice for us, and what an incredible moment it will be when you stand on the Mt. of Olives in Jerusalem, where Jesus ascended in to heaven (Acts 1 – you remember the second lesson on Sunday May 21). [Obviously, pulled from a typical ad.]

Trips to Israel typically run 7 days to 2 weeks and visit many of the sites mentioned in the Bible. The trips can be tailored to fit our specific needs, and hopefully we can be led by pastor or a guide that we know from our area. An example of a trip like this would be 10 days and cost about \$2000 to \$3000 per person.

El Camino de Santiago

This second trip is for the more adventurous or highly spiritually motivated traveler. It involves a lot of walking for up to a month, depending on how

dedicated you are. The trip follows El Camino de Santiago (or Road of St. James) for over 500 miles. The road or "Way" starts in France, crosses the Pyrenees, and then travels mainly west almost all the way to the Pacific Ocean. This Way actually follows a series of pilgrimages leading to the Cathedral of Santiago de Compostela where the relics of Saint James the Great were discovered in the 9th century. Along the way are a lot of chapels and religious places of interest. This route has become very popular by many people from all over the world. Many still follow its routes as a form of a spiritual path or retreat for their spiritual growth. It is also popular with hikers, cyclers, and organized tour groups (there's even one by REI Co-op). It was the setting for the movie "The Way" staring Emilio Estevez and Martin Sheen.

If 500 miles just sounds way too ambitious for you, you can decide to do only a portion of the trip like starting half way and still finishing at the Cathedral. Or you can pay a lot more money and be periodically driven over much of the walking distance. If you want to take the economy trip, you can backpack the whole 500 miles and save money on the hostiles or "motels" along the way. Accommodations vary from very crude to quite luxurious depending on how much you want to pay. You can walk the whole route, 31 days, for about \$38 per day, including hotel and food. Costs go up substantially when you're driven or you stay in swanky hotels.

I am planning a meeting sometime in June where those interested can meet to get more information. Other meetings will follow after we find out how many are interested and what we plan to do. Stay tuned for more information. If you are interested, please let me know or tell Pastor or an Elder.

NORD EST HAITI LUTHERAN MISSION (NEHLM) UPDATE - JUNE 2023

Greetings in the Name of Our Lord Jesus Christ. Amen.

When I recently called Rev. Daniel Paul, he was in Fort Liberte to attend a class for lawyers. The endeavor of being involved with law has served Rev. Paul well over the last couple of years as he has overseen the ministry. The instability that Haiti has had since it won independence in 1804 has often been increased with foreign intervention. Many times foreign agencies and governments intended well, but their processes inhibited Haiti from being a more stable country by struggling through their situation. Haiti's present political situation is fairly intense with an assassinated president in 2021 with no elections since then. Gangs are controlling many facets of society; many of these gangs have political connections. We pray for Rev. Paul and the other Haitians who are diligently working to do what they can for their country.

Cholera continues to be an issue in Nord Est Haiti. The sanitizing stations that were purchased several weeks ago are being used. They are now pursuing hooking up further plumbing for extended use. There is a sanitizing station at the girls' home, boys' home, and at the school. At Baja, a smaller unit is available for them to use. We are thankful to be involved with their pursuit of careful hygiene.

Nord Est Haiti is getting rain now. The gardens were a little bit flooded after one storm but have recovered and are doing well. In Ouanaminthe there was some minor flooding that lasted only a couple hours. The ministry's facilities did not have issues.




