FROM THE PASTOR

CONTROLLING TIME

In his letter to the people in Ephesus, the Apostle Paul exhorts them: "Look carefully then how you walk, not as unwise but as wise, making the best use of the time, because the days are evil" (Ephesians 5:15-16). Today is a very important day to make our lives meaningful. Yesterday is history, and tomorrow may never come. At some point in life, we start asking, "Where did the months and the years go?" Time is an irreplaceable commodity that God grants us, a precious period of opportunity for fulfilling the purposes for which we exist. Living as stewards, we realize the importance of time and use it properly. Wise use of time starts by living a life for Christ. If our time, energy, and focus are only on material wealth or other worldly successes, our time has been wasted.

While we must spend time providing for our needs, our life's purpose must be to do the Lord's work. Jesus, who "did not come to be serve but to serve" (Matthew 20:28), is our model. Colossians 4:2 says, "Continue steadfastly in prayer, being watchful in it with thanksgiving."

1 Thessalonians 5:17 says, "pray without ceasing,"

James 5:16b, says "The prayer of a righteous person has great power as it is working."

1 Peter 3:12, says "For the eyes of the Lord are on the righteous, and his ears are open to their prayer. But the face of the Lord is against those who do evil."

ADVENT SERIES INTRODUCTION PEACE CAME TO EARTH

Peace is our common pursuit. As Advent leads us to Christmas, we are especially seeking a distinct season of peace. We need a quiet place to rest during this restless time. Year after year, with each Advent season, we wonder if this year will bring a peace that endures. We crave the reassurance that God knows all our needs and will provide for them, not just for these short weeks but for every season.

Often, we grow impatient as we seek peace. Despite knowing the promises of God to provide for us, we might try to find peace on our own. We then define peace according to the ways we seek it. We might imagine that peace comes when we finally have enough of all the things we plan to buy. Or we might look for the perfect place where peace is undisturbed solitude, the cabin beside a still lake. We might seek peace by escaping memories of the past. Or peace might be an elusive future where everyone does exactly what they should. These are our many ways of defining peace, but sadly, each of these directions could go on and on without ever being fulfilled.

To illustrate both our pursuit of peace and God's plan for us, our Advent series this year uses a five-point star for each sermon. Each message will emphasize a different point of the star. Overall, the star reminds us of the Christmas star of Matthew 2 and that wonderful light that guided the Wise Men to find Jesus. Their long journey ended with the blessing of lasting peace. Just as the Wise Men followed the star, so we will go to each point in this Advent star. This won't be a useless journey that never ends. We will find that God meets us at each point of the star, knowing our needs and bringing us the peace we are seeking.

Since the five-point star will guide our journey, picture yourself drawing such a star. Start in the bottom left corner and draw up to the top center point. Stop and draw downward right, and back to the bottom left corner, eventually reaching each point. Every point goes a certain distance but then is stopped. In the same way, each of our paths to peace could go on and on, never being fulfilled. There won't be enough possessions or perfectly calm places to give us lasting peace. But as we seek peace in these many ways, God intersects us with a peace that both passes our understanding and yet meets our needs. God knows the many ways and directions by which we seek peace. As we journey, God meets us, halts our endless pursuits, and gives us a new understanding of His gift of peace. That peace comes always through the birth of Jesus, the Word become flesh who steps into the world and fulfills our desire for peace.

In the end, we find our lasting peace and treasure. God's peace doesn't send us on an impossible search. God's peace is not an invisible needle buried in a haystack. God's peace is a treasure laid in the straw of the manger. God's peace is the priceless Son of God, born in the stable and laid in plain view for us all. He is the diamond found in the manger's straw. As the Prince of Peace, He is the peace that we seek.


CARD BINGO - SUNDAY, NOV. 12 - 2-4PM

SCHOOL EXPLORATORY PROGRESS REPORT



The Redeemer Lutheran School Exploratory Committee continues to explore the viability of a school at Redeemer. Interim Chair Rachelle Ward provided a progress update to October 8 Voters' Meeting attendees. In summary, she said:

PARSONAGE

- It will cost more than \$100K to remove the Parsonage; and the cost of new construction is running \$250-\$300/sq. ft.
- Before a contractor can provide an accurate remodel cost estimate, the Parsonage must be surveyed and tested for hazardous materials, and an architectural firm must complete a site plan with basic remodel drawings.
- Whether removed or remodeled, the Parsonage must be surveyed and tested for hazardous materials and that will cost about \$4K.

John Strege said, "We need to decide what to do with the Parsonage. If we leave it sitting there, we could lose our tax-exempt status."

Dan Niebuhr said, "And if we rent it, we could lose our non-profit status."


Dan said also, Nate and Ariel Gruzs are moving back to the Tri-Cities and will occupy the Parsonage, temporarily. He said Nate will provide some duties for Redeemer while there.

GARAGE

Voters passed a school committee motion "...to allot \$4K from the Hartman Memorial Fund to survey and test the Parsonage for hazardous substances (e.g., asbestos, lead)."

The current top floor of the

Parsonage has many small rooms – a kitchen, dining room, living room, study, bathroom, utility room, and several small bedrooms; as well as a garage.



The school committee envisions the remodeled top floor of the Parsonage having three 24' x 24' classrooms that look out over the city, two lavatories, and a wide hallway. An office with a small lavatory, a teacher's workroom, and an attractive and secure main entrance would be added to the top floor as "new builds."

The committee envisions the

bottom floor of the Parsonage being used for storage and the building's heating and cooling unit.

So what "next steps" does the school committee foresee?

- If hazardous materials are found in the Parsonage, they will need to be removed before the Parsonage can be demolished or remodeled. A hazardous materials removal cost estimate from a certified abatement company will be presented for Voters' Assembly approval.
- The school committee will have an architectural firm develop a site plan based on long-term and short-term goals and needs and the conceptual use of the Parsonage.
- The site plan's architectural drawings for a remodeled Parsonage will be provided to contractors for a remodeling cost estimate. The remodeling cost estimate and other pertinent information will be presented to the Voters' Assembly to help them determine the appropriate path forward.
