LOVING OTHERS

The relationship that each of us has with Jesus is rooted in love. John 3:16 tells us that it was because of His love for us that God gave His only son to die for our sins. In spite of our wicked and sinful ways, God demonstrated His love for us by giving His only Son to die on the Cross. In response to His tremendous love for us, we can do nothing but share His love with others. In John 13:34 Jesus said, "A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another. By this all men will know that you are My disciples, if you love one another." Because He has first loved us (1 John 5:19), we are empowered to share His love.

"God is love. Whoever lives in love lives in God, and God in him" (1 John 4:16). When we love others, God's love is made complete. Love is the distinguishing mark of God's followers. We are called to model Jesus' love. "By this all men will know that you are My disciples, if you love one another" (John 3:16b). Filled with God's love, we can give and serve others.

Through the Parable of the Good Samaritan (Luke 10:25-37), we are given an example of how we are to share our love with others. Traveling on the road to Jericho, the Good Samaritan found a man who had been beaten and robbed. The Good Samaritan stopped and attended to the injured person. After he had bandaged his wounds, he took him to an inn where he paid for his room and care. The Samaritan sacrificed money, time, and possessions and risked his own health and safety for a stranger who was wounded. By putting no limits on how far he was willing to go to help this stranger, the Samaritan demonstrated the love we should have for others.

As God's disciples filled with His love, we will be compelled to do acts of love for others. "For Christ's love compels us, because we are convinced that one died for all, therefore all died. And He died for all, that those who live should no longer live for themselves but for Him Who died for them and was raised again" (2 Corinthians 5:14-15). Through our acts of love, we will be obeying Jesus' commandment to love one another.

LET'S TALK ABOUT GRIEF

Many times this month I sat at my computer and my mind was a complete blank about what to write for this newsletter. Given the number of illnesses and loss in our congregation, I've chosen to deviate from writing about the grief model discussed in the previous article. Instead, I would like to talk about the human part we see and feel in ourselves and others.

I do not know about you but when I see grief effects in others I feel somewhat helpless. Following are some ways we can give support:

- First and foremost for me is prayer
- When someone is grieving offer support. This can be as simple as listening to the griever with no judgment.
- Often times sitting quietly with the griever is supportive and calming. Hold their hand if it feels right.
- Ask the griever to tell you about the loss. Ask for and use the name of the person who has died or is ill. Encourage the griever to tell you about the person.
- We all know that when the memorial services are over family and friends return home and to their lives. Visit or telephone the griever, check up on them, perhaps even invite them out for a meal or to attend a function with you.
- Make sure the griever knows you expect nothing from them and their way of grieving is perfect for them.

Just a few thoughts to help us and others who are experiencing loss.
